
Prayer Brunch August 15

Building Project

On 7/2/19, the BGUMC Building Project Team (with Pastor Kathy) held our third meeting with the architect and builder to review updated architectural drawings and to complete additional brainstorming of design elements, including windows, woodwork and trim, flooring, foundation, the lift, etc. The architect will now create detailed drawings, to be used by the builder to determine costs in detail. These drawings will also be used by the building project team to obtain bids for work to be done by local contractors, such as the septic system, siding, HVAC, plumbing, flooring, etc. The architect hopes to have these drawings to the builder sometime yet in July in order that the builder can create his detailed cost description.






All the time

The Gathering House Story

During the ministry of Pastor Cindy, Gathering House was formed. Pastor Cindy had a passion for prison ministry and establishing a faith based farm which could provide help, hope, and faith to the formerly incarcerated.

In spite of many efforts and hard work, the "farm" did not materialize. We were short of funds, volunteers and a suitable location.

In April the Executive Committee (Tena Harren and Arlene Wetzel) decided to disband Gathering House. The other committee members (Don Wetzel, Bill Olson, Karen Olson, Char Frankenberry and Faye Kanne) all agreed.

With the blessing from a generous donor, funds held by Gathering House were dispersed to:

- 1) Gateway to Discovery Ft Dodge IA
- 2) Emma Norton Twin Cities
- 3) Bethlehem Inn Waseca
- 4) Ruth's House-Faribault

Prison ministry programs were started and still continue. Don and Bill have been doing a Bible study at the Rice County Jail and now hope to do it weekly. Karen and Arlene do a weekly Bible study at the Steele County Detention Center. Char and Faye have done an art class at the SCDC for 7+ years but because of changing policies at the DC and rapid turnover of inmates, the interest in the program was fading so it was decided not to continue. Many amazing pieces of art were created by some of the long term inmates.

In all of the programs, volunteers received much more than they gave.

Community Worship with Song..... & A Slice!

More perfect weather could not have been found on Sunday July 21st as all 3 of our newly yoked Methodist churches joined in an outdoor worship setting at the Pleasant Grove Pizza Farm. The morning's event was created, hosted, and led by Blooming Grove UMC. As usual, Lyndy Zabel and all the members of World Beat Connection Christian band had us singing, clapping, jiving, jitterbugging (!! Yes, that's right!), smiling, and **truly feeling** the spirit – both during the worship service, as well as afterward while we savored an assortment of taste bud-tantalizing 'pies', and sweet treats.



With this year's focus on Holding God's Holy World in Our Hands we were led, both in word through responsive readings, prayers, and liturgy, and in song through congregational hymns and in immersing ourselves in the music shared by World Beat Connection to acknowledge our role in 'holding this world'. Once again we gathered an offering for a cause which has touched our hearts: the small farming community of Hamburg, Iowa whose livelihood – no, whose very existence - has been devastated by the ongoing flooding which began for them in March. We held Hamburg in our

hands and hearts, as those hands placed money in the offering baskets. Janesville UMC youth willingly and eagerly helped pass those baskets. Additional monies were raised (via pizza sales and bake sale) to assist support of a local piece of our world – Waseca's *Bethlehem Inn* which offers short-term housing for women and children during which they are also assisted in regaining independence and a meaningful place in society. Thinking of our responsibility as stewards of this world, we even had compostable plates and forks, and colorful re-useable (cloth) napkins.

Emily and Bill (Pleasant Grove Pizza Farm owners) graciously allowed us to descend upon and literally take over their space as worshippers arrived by car, motorcycle, baby strollers and tractor-drawn wagon. \$2.00 of each and every pizza purchased during our time there was donated to the *Bethlehem Inn*. And we can't forget the amazing assortment of goodies at the bake sale (made and donated by our church ladies... maybe a fella or 2 also offered their baking skills), with those monies also going to one or both of the aforementioned mission focuses.

For the kids, there were animals to be watched and petted, balls to be kicked, catch to be played and the on-going music which the little ones were less inhibited about 'cutting loose' to jive. All told, there were 86 people who joined to worship together, plus the band! Through their wonderful generosity, we will send \$560.73 to the Iowa Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church to be used to aid the community of Hamburg, and \$408.00 to *Bethlehem Inn* of Waseca (\$80 of pizza sales & \$328.00 from bake sale).

In light of the recent news about children in U.S. government holding facilities along the U.S.-Mexico border, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) has received numerous requests to respond. We have heard the plea for action from the church. Unfortunately, the facilities in question are managed in such a way that precludes even UMCOR's assistance. Access to these government facilities is extremely limited.

As the arm of The United Methodist Church mandated to cultivate and promote mission, the General Board of Global Ministries seeks to equip your church with tools to use as you confront the frustration and helplessness that this situation evokes. While this particular case is in the U.S., we recognize that migration is a global issue and the breadth and depth of our Global Migration programming at UMCOR and Global Ministries reflects that fact.

As a church that is united on the need to care for children, we can be in mission together, Global Ministries encourages you to take part in solidarity for suffering children in three ways:

- 1. PRAY - We encourage you to pray for children.** Below, you will find a prayer to use for suffering children everywhere or specifically for the children suffering along the border.
- 2. ACT - We encourage you to act on behalf of children.** While we cannot take UMCOR hygiene kits to the U.S. government holding centers, we are distributing UMCOR hygiene kits at transitional shelters all along the US-Mexico border. In the last three months, UMCOR delivered 46,128 hygiene kits to six church-run transitional shelters. - 3. GIVE - Finally, we encourage you to give on behalf of children.** Through the Global Migration Advance (<https://advance.umcmmission.org/p-525->

[global-migration.aspx](https://advance.umcmmission.org/p-525-global-migration.aspx)), UMCOR provides grants to organizations along the U.S. border and elsewhere around the world that are working to fill gaps in the needs and rights of migrants.

Jesus implored his disciples to welcome the children. This is our mission: to make sure the children are welcomed. Thank you for your prayers, your actions and your gifts.
