RE: Nov/Dec Return to In-Person Worship**

BGUMC Survey Results

Thank you for engaging wholeheartedly in our BGUMC “Return to Worship Survey”! We greatly appreciate the time and thought that you gave in your responses. Here are the results:

24 family units responded - total of 46 people

- 5 family units (21%), with a total of 11 people, indicated they would like to attend a modified version of indoor worship at BG in Nov/Dec as described in the survey. 2 of these 5 family units indicated they would be willing to help with the planning/implementation.
- 19 family units, (79%) with a total of 35 people, indicated they are not comfortable in returning to in-person worship at BG at this time. 2 of these family units indicated they would still be willing to help with planning/ implementation and another 4 indicated that they *may* be willing to help with planning/implementation.

General Themes of Survey Comments

- I can't wait to get back to in-person worship in the sanctuary and enjoy the fellowship of this community, but I feel that it is not safe or prudent at this moment in time. The risk is too great right now. Let's wait until the COVID-19 numbers are back at a safe level and review again.
- I would prefer to wait until things change so that we can sing again and not have to wear masks.
- With my, and/or my family's exposure in the community (jobs, schools, daycare, etc.), we would be concerned that we might inadvertently bring the virus into the congregation. Or that someone else might inadvertently bring it with them and we would take it home with us.
- How best can we be good stewards of our own health and the health of those around us, both at home, and in church, especially those who are most vulnerable?
- We would love to still be together in worship in some creative way - might there be a way to continue holding once-a-month outdoor drive-up worship if the weather allows, i.e. wouldn't it be great if our FM transmitter can broadcast through church walls?

BGUMC Council 11/4/2020 Decision

Throughout October, significant COVID-19 changes occurred that impacted our BG Council's ultimate decision about returning to in-the-building worship. (See below.) Based on these changes, along with our survey results, we decided it was most prudent to step back from plans for returning to in-person worship inside the building for Nov/Dec. We will reassess in mid-December for January. (Janesville UMC and Waterville EUMC congregations have made this same decision.) Weekly virtual worship will continue to be offered via Facebook. We are excited to now focus our energy into creating Advent/Christmas opportunities to be in worship together - just not inside the building - and possibly Thanksgiving as well! We acknowledge that there is sadness mixed with these decisions, but we want to continue to hold people's lives within our congregation, and our communities, in great care. Again, we thank you for your survey input, and your help in making this difficult decision.

COVID-19 Changes that impacted our decision:

- **October:** MN COVID-19 cases/hospitalizations/deaths are increasing rapidly, with group gatherings now the most significant source of spread.
- **10/27/20:** MN Conference of the UMC dialed back their Regathering Plan to the Orange Phase, due to uptick in COVID-19 activity. They request that we now limit in-person gatherings to 10 people or fewer while wearing masks and maintaining social distancing, as group gatherings have been the most significant source of the spread of COVID-19 in recent weeks. At a very minimum - they request that we adhere to the governor's guidelines and closely watch the data in our community, as well as actions of our local school districts. They asked that we make decisions, in consultation with local officials, that will protect the vulnerable, our neighbors, and each other and still provide meaningful spiritual leadership to our community.
- **10/27/20:** Prairie Lakes Parish Leadership Team (PPRC members + Council Chairs) reviewed the two items above and recommended that we can best “love and care for our neighbor” by not going back into our building for worship through year's end, and that we re-evaluate in mid-December for the remaining months of winter. This recommendation also considered the need to reduce risk for the health of Pastor Kathy and her family wherever we can, and to honor current pleas from the medical community to limit indoor gatherings when possible.

Emma Norton Services St. Paul/Maplewood

Emma Norton Services (ENS) is a nonprofit organization actively combating poverty and positively impacting more than 250 people annually. ENS partners with women, children, and families who are homeless and experiencing the challenges of mental and/or chemical disabilities. Without having to worry about the basic need of a safe, secure place to live, women and children can utilize and focus on supportive programs, life skills, services and opportunities available to accomplish their goals. ENS fosters stability and encourages personal growth at two locations: Emma Norton Residence in the heart of downtown St. Paul is home to 50 individual women - Emma’s Place in Maplewood is home to 13 single parent families with three or more children. Housing is permanent - the women and families may reside with ENS as long as they desire.

Simpson Housing Services Minneapolis

Simpson Housing Services began as an emergency overnight shelter in the basement of Simpson United Methodist Church in 1982. Simpson has since become a leading nonprofit providing assistance to people experiencing homelessness. In response to unmet community needs, their programs have grown to include emergency shelter, single adult supportive housing, and family supportive housing. They work across the metro area, partnering with landlords and developers to find affordable housing for all families and individuals. At any given time, they provide supportive services to 100 individuals and 210 families with over 500 children.

Joyce Uptown Foodshelf Minneapolis

The mission of the Joyce Uptown Food Shelf is to distribute food to those in need, with respect and dignity, as an expression of the love of God. In a message from their website: “We join our community in mourning Mr. Floyd’s tragic death. We stand with everyone seeking to root out the injustices within our current systems and support full equity for all people. The collateral damage to small businesses has only further intensified the need to support our neighbors experiencing food insecurity. We are working with Hunger Solutions and other organizations in our community to coordinate efforts to support and distribute food to our community.”

MN Conference Committee on Native American Ministry’s Diaper Drop

The casino and restaurant industry, a primary source of revenue in our Native American communities of Minnesota, has been severely impacted by the COVID-19 related closings and limited re-openings. Many of our native brothers and sisters have been without income for a number of months, and/or are now working with limited income. In an effort to share our care and our resources, the MN Conference Committee on Native American Ministry (CONAN), of which Cindy Saufferer is a member, is leading an effort called “Diaper Drops”. Funds raised by our Conference Love Offering will be used to purchase semi-loads of factory-direct diapers, which will be delivered to Health & Human Services groups in our MN native communities, to be given to persons in need of these important supplies for their children.



Construction Begins

We are excited to share photos and stories of construction that has begun at Blooming Grove United Methodist - as we build a new addition on the south end of the church to make our building accessible for all. The approximately 938 sq. foot addition will have a ground-level handicap-accessible entrance, complete with accessible restrooms, an accessible gathering space, and a 3-stop lift that will provide access to both the sanctuary and the basement.

Meeting – October 14, 2020

Agenda

Items to Consider Re: In-Person Worship

1. The Parish Leadership Team has discussed what would be needed to return to in-person worship within our sanctuaries as the cold weather moves in. Their recommendation was to leave the “should we return to indoor worship” decision up to each church, with an idea that there could possibly be services held four Sundays a month in the parish - two Sundays with two services per morning (at Janesville and Waterville) and two Sundays with services at BG only. Weekly virtual services would continue to be offered. 5th Sundays would be virtual worship only.
2. Waterville’s council has met, and they suggest one service per month at each church, to reduce the inadvertent spread of COVID-19 by Pastor Kathy moving between congregations on the same morning and to reduce the amount of community exposure to Pastor Kathy in one morning. As of right now, they plan to hold one service a month in their building.
3. Conference Update: Since June of this year, there have been 120 confirmed cases of COVID-19 traced to funerals and other church-related gatherings. The Bishop has asked for caution. Conference guidelines call for masks, no singing, no socializing/coffee time, etc. Most of our BGUMC council members in attendance at tonight’s meeting prefer to continue online under those restrictions.
4. In order to return to the building, we would need to create a full-blown preparedness plan, which would need to be submitted to and approved by the District Superintendent. (We are already approved for yellow phase, but this would be more detailed.) We would also need an administrator for the plan.
5. We appreciate that there are members who want to be back in the building. Safety of our members needs to be our first consideration as a church council. In order to gauge interest in returning, we decided to create and disseminate a survey. This survey will ask if people are comfortable returning to in-person worship, make clear the requirements under which this can happen, and ask further (if they want to return) if they are willing to take on the tasks to make this happen. Pastor Kathy will collect the responses, and then



- we will proceed. If there are 10 folks who wish to attend, she will do a service here. Hjordi and Judy will draft something and send it out to the other attendees for review by Saturday (10/17). Once that’s okayed, it will go to the rest of the council for review. We will try to get this sent out to the membership by October 22.
6. If there is interest, there will be services in November and December. We will revisit for January and February, depending upon construction and virus progression.
 7. Another consideration is the contractors who will be in and out of the building now that construction has begun on our addition. Cindy will ask Brad about construction project access, as we probably need to have separate entrance and exit doors.
 8. Kathy will figure something out for Christmas Eve. Weather permitting, we may gather in the parking lot or along the road and sing Silent Night together!

Church Cleaning

1. Nancy Morris and her sister Susan have asked to discontinue their role in cleaning twice a month at BGUMC due to hip surgery for Susan and scheduling changes for Nancy. We discussed professional cleaning services, though they are most likely more expensive. It was decided to ask the congregation first, in the event someone would like to take on the job, or knows someone who would like to do it. Cindy will write up something for The Visitor, and we will ask on our Facebook page.

Charge Conference

1. Charge Conference-related forms need to be completed by November 1st. We reviewed the list:
 - Nominations needs to complete the list of officers
 - Inactive/Unresponsive – Carolyn. Pastor Kathy finds this report unnecessary, so it will not be completed this year.
 - Numbers 5 & 7 – PPRC
 - Housing – only if something changes
 - Trustees – Brad Spinler
 - Finance – Hjordi
 - Audit – Tracie
 - Missions – Judy
2. The Budget needs to be set, so the Finance team needs to meet. Hjordi will set something up.
3. Even with a virtual meeting, there will need to be a presiding elder. We will check with Pastor Sharon Nelson. Another possibility is Pastor Donna Dempewolf.

Pastor Kathy closed with prayer.

Outdoor Drive-up Worship

This summer/fall, BGUMC offered outdoor drive-up worship as a way for our congregation to continue gathering in person during the COVID-19 pandemic. 
Saturday, October 10th: This afternoon's parking lot in our west "Field of Dreams" - looking east toward the church.
