Our 2023 Lent and Easter Offering will go to the Emma Norton Residence - Campaign for Restoring Waters – for construction of new residence & organizational headquarters in the Highland Bridge neighborhood of St. Paul. Please make your check out to BGUMC with "Emma Norton" in the memo line or written on your offering envelope. Your offering will enable Emma Norton to act boldly for justice and equity in our greater community. On behalf of the lives your offering will change, thank you. Here is a brief recap of the story of "Restoring Waters".

For the past 63 years, the Emma Norton Residence in downtown St. Paul has housed hundreds of residents that are either affected by mental illness, struggle with chemical health issues, or have dual diagnoses or disabilities. These women commonly

face intergenerational poverty and homelessness, experience the effects of systemic racism, deal with numerous barriers to stability and independence, and often, all of the above. The housing and services provided in Emma Norton's current facility has transformed countless lives, but their needs for a physical space have changed as Emma Norton grows. Over the last half-century, there have been countless advancements in the neuroscience and architecture behind creating healing spaces. After five years of dreaming, planning, and countless hours of work, Emma Norton began implementing the fruit of these advancements to better serve their mission and our community.

On January 17th, 2023, Emma Norton broke ground for a new residence in Highland Bridge, -"Restoring Waters". Designed to be open and welcoming, Restoring Waters will create spaces for community building, volunteer support, relaxation, exercise, healthcare, and more. Trauma-informed, the facility's architecture incorporates natural light, artwork, curved hallways, access to nature, and various flexible and calming areas that place a foundation for the healing community that is Emma Norton. The current Emma Norton Residence consists of many rooms that house two people, with residents sharing each floor's community bathroom and dining in the building's cafeteria. There will be a profound difference at Restoring Waters. Each of the 56 alcove apartments for single occupants and four one-bedroom apartments for small families, will be complete with its own bathroom and kitchen. These simple but impactful improvements will increase the resident's quality of life by providing privacy for each resident while creating a space that promotes safety, empowerment, growth, and, above all, healing.



"Farmer or farm wife? Why not both?"

Kristin Krell is clearly a teacher – she just doesn't have her own classroom.

The Medford High School graduate went to South Dakota State University to be an ag teacher. She and her husband Justin farm north of Blooming Prairie on "just enough acres to keep us busy."

But as life would have it "there weren't many teaching jobs in the area when I got out of college," so Krell worked at Mower County Extension Service with 4-Hers, instead.

"I wanted to teach, but people move, farms don't," she said, and farming has always been a part of her life. "I still like to teach and work with youth in the ag industry."

That includes their own three daughters: Leah, 7; Kaylee, 4; and Emery, 1.

Because their family is so young, Krell said, "my role on the farm is keeping everything going at home. I help where needed – getting parts, providing rides, food – but we work together as a couple to make decisions for the farm."

The couple both have full-time jobs off the farm, as well. Kristin now works as the senior marketing manager for Environmental Tillage Systems, which manufactures strip-till equipment.

Justin Krell is an area agronomist manager for LG Seeds.

"For Justin and I, the ultimate goal is no off-farm jobs," Kristin said. "Where we're at, it's just not something we can make happen right now, but it'll always be a goal of ours."

Every progressive farmer, she said, "has plans to grow. It may not just be purchasing land, but adding other enterprises, like a trucking business, to help other farmers."

Still, Krell admitted, "no matter what generation – there is reluctance in progressing and making the farm bigger, and that could be the uncertainty. With anything in farming, there's a risk.

"They say a farmer only gets 40 times to plant and harvest a crop in their lifetime" she said. "That's not a lot of chances, so making changes in the operation – big or little – is always a big decision."

While Krell has faith the family farm will continue, "what the need will look like, and how we'll produce it might change a little bit. I do think each member of family farms may start specializing in things more than we've ever seen, from livestock to crops to equipment – but use the people and what they have on hand to continue that multi-generation farm." That includes their own family, she said.

"It would be great for Justin and I to be able to pass down the farm to our girls," Krell said. "It's a hope we've talked about; as we continue farming and growing our operation, it's always in the back of my mind about how to set it up if a daughter – or two or three – want to come home and farm with us."

Of course, she said, "we want them to do what they want, but we always joke that it would be fun to have an accountant and a veterinarian...still help out on the farm in that aspect."

Krell had the opportunity to attend a recent class with Annie's Project, a non-profit that's designed to empower and educate women in agriculture.

"A lot of the things were refreshers" she said, "but it was also connecting with other farm wives in the area. We're a minority, as far as jobs, so to make those connections and have those resources was great."

The class, Krell said, "really digs into the details of the operation – things like grain marketing, balance sheets – that maybe some farm wives don't have as much influence or understanding of."

So does she consider herself a farmer? Or a farm wife?

"Both," Krell said. "I see a need within our operation to have both: the supporting role at home as well as the help on the farm itself. I know all the ladies I work with would be able to run some type of equipment, or understand the day-to-day work, even if they're not doing it themselves.

She's seen it firsthand, growing up on a row-farm, immersed in a life of agriculture, much like her own little girls. Even now, she said, farming is something they enjoy. "They know not everyone gets to ride in combines or tractors" Krell said. "I know that not all their friends know where an egg comes from, so they get to teach friends that. They may not realize it, but they do take pride in the things they're learning and that they have that knowledge already at that young age."

Seems about right, for the daughters of a teacher – and farmer.



Your BGUMC PPRC Members at Work: Updating our Church Profile

In the month of April, our BGUMC Pastor Parish Relations Committee members (Chuck & Linda Danks, Allison Janke, Judy Mahler, Cindy Saufferer) will be working together to update our BGUMC church profile. This work will be done at the request from the leadership team of our MN UMC Conference - for all United Methodist Churches in Minnesota.

These profiles are filed in our MN Conference Office as well as the offices of each of the MN District Superintendents. Walking in the Spirit

Walking is good for my soul. I love to walk--except when the temperature is too cool or too hot or if there is any type of moisture in the air. And forget it if there is even the hint of ice. You could call me a fair-weather walker, but you would be more accurate if you called me a perfect weather walker!

So why in the world would I hit the icy streets of Minneapolis this past Valentine's Day in the pouring rain? Simple, something more important than my comfort, MMIWR 2023: Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives (MMIWR) March.

MMIW is a movement that advocates for the end of violence against Native women. It also seeks to draw attention to the high rates of disappearances and the murders of Native people. You may notice the term MMIWR in the event title. The "R" has been added to acknowledge the LGBTQIA, Two Spirit, non-binary relatives, as well as Native men and boys, who are also targeted.

In 2019, the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women's Task Force was created. As a result of their work, Minnesota formed the nation's first state office on missing, murdered Indigenous people and whose purpose is to reduce and end violence against indigenous women, girls, and two spirit people in Minnesota.

Although American Indian women and girls make up just 1% of the state's population, 8% of all murdered women and girls in Minnesota were American Indian. During any given month from 2012 to 2020, there were 27-54 American Indian women and girls missing in Minnesota. I would ask the question, "When was the last time you saw a story in the news about one of these girls"?

On a rainy Valentine's Day, I walked alongside families carrying posters of loved ones who are missing or have been murdered. I noticed out of the hundreds who are marching, very few are white. I am once again face to face with my privilege. The weather has lost its signifi-

cance as empathy overwhelms the moment and I consider my own three daughters. Knowledge of statistics and facts seem a bit useless if I don't act.

So, I walk, it is good for my soul.

I went on to do something else I excel at, talking much and saying nothing.

The idea behind Fat Tuesday was to rid the home of all rich food and prepare for the fasting and the penitence of Lent. Our thinking in having the Fat Tuesday meal was learning about Fat Tuesday and Lent, while also coming together in fellowship. Cindy led us with facts and trivia about Fat Tuesday. Mardi Gras translated from French to English is Fat Tuesday. The food was eaten, people talked, laughed, and learned. All in all, I think it was mission accomplished.


