### Down the Drain Fundraiser \$2,307 of \$3,500 Estimated Project Cost Raised to-date

After 72 years of faithful service in clean-up from countless gatherings over food and fellowship, the drain system for our BGUMC basement kitchen sinks became compromised by a combination of tree roots, corrosion, and the make-up of drain supplies that were available back in 1951 (due to raw-material shortages impacted by war-time). Our exciting solution was implemented in mid-March! It involves two individual pumps (one for each sink location) that will grind any small food particles that go into the dishwater and that will then push the water through interior piping that will carry it to join the water flow to the new septic system. *We need your help in raising the \$3,500 needed to fund this work.* If you would like to contribute, please note "Down the Drain" on your check or offering envelope, and place your donation in the white "offering coffeepot" at the back of the sanctuary. Checks should be made out to Blooming Grove UMC. In addition, all loose change added to the "Shaker Can" at the back of the sanctuary will go to this project. Thank you, in advance, for your help!

Our March Lenten Walleye Fish Fry was a huge success this year! 302 people came through our doors to enjoy a delicious meal of fish, scalloped potatoes, green beans, corn, dinner roll, and desert. \$4,072 was raised through our free-will offering, with all proceeds going toward payment of the loan for our new south addition – built to make our church fully accessible to all.

A huge thanks goes to Brad and Tracie Spinler, and their extended family, for coordinating this event, including the preparation of all of the food.

Thank you also to those of all ages from our congregation who cleaned and completed set-up at church, baked sweet treats for dessert, fried fish, served as "fish runners", hosted and served at the meal, and stayed afterwards for clean-up. As the saying goes it takes a village!













### **Palm Sunday**

### **Good Friday**

sanctuary, and after each reading, one of the candles in the candelabra was extinguished, ultimately leaving only the Christ candle lit - and then, after the final reading, and a loud crash of thunder, it too, was extinguished and carried out of the sanctuary. The setting, music, and variety of voices who shared the scripture readings, allowed all of us in attendance to have a tangible and personal placement in the stories shared that night of Christ's great sacrifice.

We gathered in the early morning to celebrate the good news of the resurrection. Alleluia! Christ the Lord is risen indeed!



March 10, 2024: Thank You to all emergency responders and those who provided assistance during the Waseca County wildfires on Sunday March, 3<sup>rd</sup>

### Sent to each of the First Responder Agencies listed at the bottom of this letter

Our congregation extends heartfelt thanks for all that the members of your agency did last Sunday, March 3<sup>rd</sup> to hold back, and extinguish, the wind-fueled wildfire that engulfed the NE corner of Waseca County and parts of Steele County. Due to the Herculean efforts of everyone involved, homes and lives were saved – none were lost. The risks, time, expertise, resources, and sheer will that were involved in fighting this fire were beyond measure. We are humbled by the selfless

service of the men and women involved.

Our connection to the fire, and your work, is very personal. The NE portion of the fire was stopped just 3 miles south of our church. A number of our rural neighbors, including some from our congregation, had to evacuate their homes, returning to give thanks that the fire had been "held" just across the road from their driveways, or in their yards. Others in our congregation had their bags packed, ready to leave on a minute's notice if the wind changed direction, but the fire was stopped before evacuation was needed. Others from our church watched and prayed with great worry as flames moved closer and closer to their neighbors' farms. Again, the fire was stopped, and no outbuildings or animals were lost. Another person in our church family provided pasture-land as a staging area for emergency responders as the flames roared in the distance.

During our morning worship today, we listed the names of all responding agencies at the front of our sanctuary and joined together in this prayer of thanks for you...

Easter message from Bishop Lanette Plambeck, resident bishop for the Dakotas-Minnesota Episcopal Area of The United Methodist Church.
