



Be the Light



How many years ago? "72!!" What happened? "It was the winter of the big snow!!"

Those responses, exuberantly repeated prefacing each of the five vignettes re-enacted by our youngsters, youth, and young adults, got us all engaged. It was our Feb. 12th, 2023, worship service, but it was a retelling of the true accounts of members of our very own church family of yesteryear -72 years ago. In re-enacting, the drifts piled up in the aisles (cotton batting). The tractors (John Deere and Oliver pedal tractors) pushed their way through the falling flakes (cotton balls and mini-metallic pom-poms). The wood gathered to create the manger we use to this very day was loaded into the horse-pulled cart (plastic sled behind 2 kid-driven stick horses) – and so it went. Simple and symbolic child-appropriate props and scenery set the stage. Direct-line-descendants (in many cases) were utilized as narrators for each of the accounts from that winter. Some very fitting liturgy, music, responsive readings (BGUMC-created poetry), familiar song-tune parodies (BGUMC created) were incorporated, and the oft-recurring last paragraph of the responsive reading: "Share God's love with one and all - No task too big, no task too small. Bring God's Kingdom



here on earth, share your heart for all it's worth! See Christ's light in all you meet. Be Christ's light with human feet!" truly emphasized and captured the essence of what happened that memorable winter. And yet also, it reminds us that today, 2023, each one of us can still be that light.

Every child had 3 or 4 parts and they meshed the whole thing together with delightful acting and enjoyment. From ages 1 ½ years old through adults 20's, 30's (and older!!) there was a "flurry" of activity in the aisles and the chancel. There was the loud "wind" of little voices saying "72" and "winter of the big snow." There was the snug warmth of working together and looking out for each other ("careful with the shovels", "Kinsley wants to drive the 'tractor", "don't trip on the 'logs", "I'll take Kaylee with me").

BGUMC's heritage is valued; that unforgettable year of buried roads isolating people also, in fact, unified them – brought them together with a common purpose of providing aid when and where it was needed. In rehearsals, planning, and presenting, we witnessed carrying forth that heritage as our youngsters looked out for each other. And really, isn't that what we all strive to do? Don't we find joy and fulfillment in reaching out to be there for someone? We all get stuck in 'snowdrifts' or trip on a 'log' or perhaps want to 'hunker down' at home sometimes; we're human, we have faults and foibles. But the 'snowdrifts', 'logs', and 'safe hunker down' situations also allow us to reevaluate the next step. One little step, then the next. No task too big, no task too small. In this time when we hear over and over again on the news of shootings, stabbings, animosity, aggression and hate, there still are (though less-

broadcast) many episodes of love and caring; let's not forget to see Christ's light in all vou meet. And above all. with one little step, then the next, let's endeavor to **be Christ's light** with human feet! That's what God has charged us to do. Thanks. kids, for impressing on us the importance



of each action that we, and you, take. (Patti Ellingson)

We Had Snow!!! & We Had Sun! & WE HAD FUN!

Upwards of three dozen snow-tubers and chaperone/

watchers were grateful that there **WAS** snow for our tubing event. Yay!! But the sun was also out, with mid 20's temps, so weatherwise it was perfect. All three of our churches were represented; additional friends or extended family members came too. The fun was preceded with safety and rules instructions by the Omega staff, brief prayer by our staff, and then they were off.

Exclamations of "WHOOAaaooaa------ !!" and "OOOHH BOoooyyyyy------" and "EEeeeaaaahh-------!" and "Looook-outttt!-----" and "Here I GGOOoooooooo-----" and various other sounds of excitement and fun could be heard as tubers descended down the long hill. The route back up? Sit on your backside on your tube and grab hold tightly to the rope! Some were naturals with the tow rope uphill; for several others there was a bit of a learning curve before mastery of the uphill ride. Some barely reached the end of the upwards tow-glide before they rapidly shoved off again for another race down along the well-worn snow route.



There was an assortment of downhill methods. Some chose belly down head-first; some bottom down feet -first, some in chains (up to 3 tubes together was allowed), some in "pig piles" (up to 3 people per tube was allowed), and some changed it up as they slid down the hill (not always necessarily pur*posely* changing it up!!) It's a chain of 3 –

whoops now it's 2 and 1 – wait, now it's 3 singles! Butt down – no! side-slide – no, now it's a belly down – wait – now it's concentric downhill circles – whoops, now it's rolling off! Nope, nope! Back on again, butt-down feet-first. The whooping and hollers and laughter were non-stop all afternoon.

To keep the tubing path in good condition, and the uphill towing path in good condition (well, and to prevent getting clobbered by a moving projectile) all tromping was to happen way off to the side. So, as photos were clicked, the photographer had to tromp and trudge up and down the outer edges of the slideway trying not to look to "drunk-like clumsy" in the deep, uneven snow (a challenge



all in itself!) all while trying not to fall and have the phone-camera get lost in the snow!



Bathrooms and an enormous array of eats (provided by the kids' parents/ grandparents) was all another drunken -tromp-and-trudge several yards away to a cabin. Bottles of water, cups of hot chocolate, several kinds of cookies including homemade ones, a huge box of variety-pack chips, even yummy ham sandwiches

and..... wait for it.... melt-in-your-mouth delicious homemade caramel rolls; 4 dozen! Mmmmm.



All in all, it was a memorably fun, successful day; and no mishaps requiring first aid. Several of the youth (and adults, too) were heard saying, "I can't wait 'til we do this again!" So, I guess it goes on next year's calendar.

Congratulations to Mikayla Spinler for successfully defending her masters in swine nutrition at Kansas State University (KSU) in February! Mikayla now embarks on the path of earning her PhD –



also at KSU. As part of her master's program, in July 2022, Mikayla and her fellow research team members were published in the National Hog Farmer regarding their study, conducted at the KSU Swine Teaching and Research Center, of the impact of flavor in sow lactation diets. They identified that increased palatability of the diet can increase feed intake during lactation, which is important for improving litter growth performance and minimizing sow weight loss.

Lent & Easter Offering to Restoring Waters

For the past 63 years, the Emma Norton Residence in downtown St. Paul has housed hundreds of residents that are either affected by mental illness, struggle with chemical health issues, or have dual diagnoses or disabilities. These women commonly face intergenerational poverty and homelessness, experience the effects of systemic racism, deal with numerous barriers to stability and independence, and often, all of the above.

Over the past decade, it has been an honor to serve on the Emma Norton Services Board where I witnessed the profound impact Emma Norton has had on countless women's (and their families) lives. But my tenure has only shown me a small portion of the impact Emma Norton has made in our community at large and why I write to you now.

Blooming Grove UMC's Easter offering has a long -standing tradition of improving lives around the world. The impact of our offering has been both far -reaching and personal. From supporting a school in the Democratic Republic of Congo that teaches best agricultural practices to more local endeavors, such as filling food shelves in our local community, we continually search for where we can create lasting impacts in our global society. This year is no different. The housing and services provided in Emma Norton's current facility has transformed countless lives, but their needs for a physical space have also changed as Emma Norton grows. Over the last half-century of operating in their current facility, there have been countless advancements in the neuroscience and architecture behind creating healing spaces. After five years of dreaming, planning, and countless hours of work, Emma Norton began implementing the fruit of these advancements to better serve their mission and our community. On January 17th, 2023, Emma Norton broke ground for a new residence in Highland Bridge, the benefactor of this year's offering, Restoring Waters.

The Restoring Waters facility will expand Emma Norton's ability to promote healing by creating a safe harbor for women on a healing journey. Designed to be open and welcoming, Restoring Waters will create spaces for community building, volunteer support, relaxation, exercise, healthcare, and more. Trauma-informed, the facility's architecture incorporates natural light, artwork, curved hallways, access to nature, and various flexible and calming areas that place a foundation for the healing community that is Emma Norton.

The current Residence consists of many rooms that house two people, with residents sharing each floor's community bathroom and dining in the building's cafeteria. There will be a profound difference at Restoring Waters through the addition of a host of amenities. Each of the 56 alcove apartments for single occupants and four one-bedroom apartments for small families, will be complete with its own bathroom and kitchen. These simple but impactful improvements will increase the resident's quality of life by providing privacy for each resident while creating a space that promotes safety, empowerment, growth, and, above all, healing.

Your offering will enable Emma Norton to act boldly for justice and equity in our greater community. On behalf of the lives your offering will change, thank you.
